WORSHIP AND FORMATION

<u>The Nursery & Toddler Room</u> is located on the first floor off the main hallway and is open from 9:50 a.m.—12:15 p.m. for ages 4 months to 3 years old. Parents may gather their children for Communion and then return them during formation hour.

Godly Play at 10:00 a.m. is for children ages 3 (by October 15) to kindergarten and is located in the first floor hallway past the restrooms. Children can be dropped off between 9:50 a.m.—10:00 a.m. Children will be brought back into the sanctuary in time for Communion. Teachers will assist them in finding their family if necessary.

<u>Trinity Kids Worship</u> at 10:00 a.m. is for children grades 1 through 5 and is located in the upstairs hallway past the restrooms in the TKW room. Children sit with their family before the service and follow the second cross of the procession out of the sanctuary and upstairs. Children will return to the sanctuary at the Peace.

<u>Trinity Kids Grow</u> at 10:00 a.m. is for middle school students grades 5 through 7 and is located immediately upstairs beside the staircase in the TKG room. Students sit with their family before the service and follow the second cross of the procession out of the sanctuary and upstairs. Students will return to the sanctuary at the Peace.

<u>Episcopal Youth Community</u> is Trinity's youth group that serves teens in grades 7 through 12 and meets Sunday evenings from 6:00 p.m.—8:00 p.m. in the youth room located in the basement level of the church.

SUNDAY SERVICES DURING EASTER

The Great Fifty Days of Easter extend from Easter Eve through the Feast of Pentecost (May 19 this year). During Easter we omit the Confession and Absolution as a reminder that Christ's resurrection redeems us from sin and death. The Easter Blessing reminds us that we are redeemed by Christ and sent into the world to serve the Risen Lord.

TODAY'S MUSIC

The composer of today's prelude William Boyce (1710-1779) sang as a boy chorister under Maurice Greene at St. Paul's Cathedral, London. He became organist of two London churches and then Master of the King's Musick following his teacher Maurice Greene. Increasing deafness caused him to give up his positions. Boyce retired to Kensington to edit a collection of *English Cathedral Music* begun by Maurice Greene. Using material collected by Greene of compositions of Purcell, Gibbons, Blow, and others, Boyce's three volumes remained in use for almost 150 years. Boyce's ten organ voluntaries follow the established form of two movements: a slow introduction followed by a lively movement. The tune for today's Sequence Hymn *Halton Holgate* (Hymn 706) was composed by Boyce. In addition to music for the church and for the theater, Boyce wrote 8 symphonies published in 1760.

The Sixth Sunday of Easter is sometimes referred to as Rogation Sunday. Technically the rogation days are Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday before Ascension Day (40 days after Easter and always on a Thursday). The days are set aside to pray for the harvest. This morning's anthem "King Jesus Hath a Garden" is a harmonization of a Dutch tune by English composer Charles Wood (1866-1926).
